

THERE ARE A NUMBER OF CEMETERIES


in Orangetown, some of them exclusive and some just family plots. The two cemeteries that have recently received attention are the Clausland Cemetery and the Rockland Cemetery. The Clausland Cemetery is located in Orangeburg, off Greenbush Road at the foot of Clausland Mountain and the Rockland Cemetery in Sparkill is off of Kings Highway on the side of the mountain. In the Clausland Cemetery the earliest recorded internment was in 1755 with a total of 239 internments. Each of these cemeteries has its own history beginning with the earliest inhabitants of Orangetown. The Rockland Cemetery was founded in 1847 and currently has 14,300 internments. The Clausland Cemetery, at the foot of Clausland Mountain has a number of Revolutionary War era militia buried there including Colonel Abraham Lent and Lieutenant Colonel Johannes Blauvelt. There are many famous local personages buried in the Rockland Cemetery such as John Fremont - The Pathfinder, Rodger Haddock, builder of Haddock Hall now known as the Silk Mill as well as Eleazer Lord and William Whiton, founders of the Rockland Cemetery. Each of these cemeteries has its own distinctive characteristics - one is built on the side of a mountain and the other off the main road. In May the Clausland Cemetery enjoyed a major restorative effort. Debris and weeds were cleared out and after substantive research, the original gravestones were cleaned and a beautiful pergola was installed as the Eagle Scout project of Dylan Tobin of Pearl River Troop # 55. I attended the ceremony on May 21, 2022 as the Rockland Cemetery celebrated its 175th birthday with pride knowing that our local ancestors are gone but not forgotten.

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


