












FROM HOT WHEELS TO GO-KARTS, the concept of playful transportation and competitive racing has held a place in the hearts of children for generations. Today, children may have access to motorized Power Wheels, but what about the challenge of building your own? The idea of children designing, creating, and racing their own vehicles has a rich history right here in Orangetown.

In 1949, the John H Secor American Legion Post No. 329 of Pearl River, in conjunction with the Pearl River Board of Trade, sponsored a three-day circus and block party which held the first Rockland County Soap Box Derby. Thereafter, the derby was held annually, and in 1964, Pearl River was awarded a charter as a regional official Soap Box Derby until 1973. In fact, thanks to a donation made by the family, the museum's permanent collection contains a photograph and trophy of the 1957 winner of the Pearl River Soap Box Derby, Ronnie Beasley. In 1956, 10 year old Sandra Konazewski was the first girl to beat 60 competitors to win the title!

In the 2000s, the Pearl River Rotary Club revived the Soap Box Derby, which gave the children of Orangetown the opportunity to connect to the past by building their own cars and racing down Central Avenue. The Soap Box Derby was more than just a race for the residents of Orangetown - it highlighted the dedication of a community and the ingenuity of its children. Although the derby was discontinued in Pearl River, it continues to live on in photos, relics, and memories. An original Pearl River Boxcar will be on display in our upcoming exhibit - Creating Community 1950.

BOXCAR DERBY RULES:



- Wheels cannot be altered in any way such as buffed, drilled or repainted
- There must be sufficient clearance for the driver's hands when handling the steering wheel
- Seat back must be movable or removable for inspection
- The break foot pedal must have an opening required for kingpin inspection
- Total cost must not exceed \$20.00 exclusive of wheels, axles, paint and steering assembly
- Overall length cannot exceed 80", width cannot exceed 40"
- Every car must have a single drag break
- The steering wheel must be no less than 7.5" and firmly attached to the shaft
- The body must not confine the driver,
- Each racer must build their own car

More 17th Century Treasures


came to a close in 2023, the museum has kept busy processing extraordinary acquisition from Jonathan Z. Freidman. A frequent visitor to and collaborator with the museum, Mr. Friedman was intimately involved with our exhibitions FROM

HOLLAND TO HERE and LOYAL **TO THE CROWN**. The objects in this donation represent invaluable pieces of history and art, and we are honored

to preserve and share them with the community of Orangetown. The first piece is a large English Bible Box, late 17th-early 18th century with an elaborate inlay of woods and forged iron hinges and lock. Such boxes were for safekeeping the most important book in the house as well as important deeds, wills and testaments. The second piece is a trio of Dutch tiles from the mid 17th century framed as one piece depicting a maritime theme of sailing ships. The third

piece is a perfect compliment to our collection of Dutch artifacts; it is a magnificent Dutch 17th century hand carved side chair made of oak featuring a tulip flanked by grape vines on its back panel and a crest flower with a guilloche decorative technique. These three objects can be viewed on exhibit at the Historic Salyer House and keep company with our large format painting, 'Portrait of a Merchant with a Falling Lace Collar'.

Additionally, Mr. Freidman gifted the museum a mezzotint print of George Washington as a Freemason dated 1852, numerous reference books, and a carved oak cabinet panel

Georg Schmauss, the little councilor and red beer brewer, in Nuremberg was born; 1619 died; 1682." In the portrait, Schamuss is depicted over a coat of arms and was likely a member of a noble family. Examination of the artist's signature led us to the possibility that this portrait was created by Paul Decker the Younger (b. 1685-1742). As Von Sandrart founded the Nuremberg Academy of Fine Arts, it is possible that Paul Decker could have seen the original
